Exodus 23:10-11

For six years you shall sow your land and gather in its yield; but the seventh year you shall let it rest and lie fallow, so that the poor of your people may eat; and what they leave the wild animals may eat. You shall do the same with your vineyard, and with your olive orchard.

Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective. Elijah was a human being like us, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. Then he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain and the earth yielded its harvest.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Today we have a full course meal of music. The service begins with some chicken broth. The Yiddish word for this is "schmaltz", and over the past hundred years has been applied to music that is "overly sentimental". The Preludes are indeed simple sentimental pieces but, although others may disagree, I feel that they still have their place. I don't know anything about the composers but they would be a part of the great bowl of schmaltz composers of a century ago.

In 1798, fresh from the garden of Eden, a salad of pieces of music was put together in the form of an oratorio by Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809). His inspiration for an oratorio was after a visit to England when he heard some of the oratorios of Handel. "The Creation" is a rather big salad, so today's Solo is just a few greens from the end of the oratorio when, on the seventh day, Adam sings thanks to God for his wonderful creation.

The meat and potatoes of so many musical presentations is the music of J.S. Bach. The "Prelude and Fugue in e minor for organ" is one of his shorter longer works for organ. Unfortunately, many of his organ works are too long to present as a Postlude in church today but this one is a smaller portion, still having plenty of substance.

I'm sorry, I am on a diet, so there is no dessert.
