Music Notes

As many of us resume activities after a Summer break, we ask God's guidance in all our doings. The lovely words of our anthem "Lead me, Lord" by Wesley express this prayer.

The organ music includes two contrasting examples of Baroque ornamentation (those little twiddly bits in the music). The Prelude by J.S. Bach, is a highly ornamented German Chorale Prelude based on a very serious text with a very serious melodic line. The Offertory, however, is based on two French dance tunes: the first a bit more serious than the other. The ornaments give a light happy character to the piece. This Offertory piece was written by a female composer which was extremely rare for the time. Elizabeth Jacquet de La Guerre (c. 1664-1729) was taught by her father and later married a church organist.

The Postlude, attributed to Bach, is a happy little prelude and fugue, with an unusual pedal solo near the beginning (done entirely with the feet). As I hear it, I can't help but think of the line from that great old hymn, the Battle Hymn of the Republic: "O be swift my soul to answer Him, be jubilant my feet".
