Notes from the Director of Music

The music of Easter continues with the **Anthem** "This Joyful Eastertide". It is interesting to trace the spread of its popularity. First of all, we can thank the Dutch for the origin of this happy carol. It was first published in Amsterdam in David's Psalmen of 1685 and the tune accompanied the words "How groot die Vreuchten zijh". The tune thus acquired the name "Vreuchten", as we see in Hymn #259. In England, George Woodward (1848-1934) made a translation in 1894 and the 4-part harmony was established later by Charles Wood. The carol first appeared in Canada in the United Church hymn book of 1930, and today is slowly gaining popularity in the United States. American organist Ronald Arnatt (b. 1930) made the arrangement which the choir sings today.

My very first organ lessons were with a dear Englishman named Eric Dowling, who had me purchase a copy of "The Organ" by John Stainer. From this book I learned pedal technique and the kind of fingering necessary for proper playing of the organ. I only had a few lessons with Mr. Dowling

who was not well at the time, and then I spent the next year studying with a very different kind of teacher, who had taught at the Paris Conservatoire. Before one of my first lessons with him, I was warming up by playing some exercises by John Stainer on the local church organ, when this new organ teacher came into the church. Upon hearing me play music by Stainer, he shouted from the back of the church, going into a strong condemnation of Stainer's music and warned me never to play from that book again. Well I'm sorry Mr. Sanderson, but today I am playing two pieces from that book for the **Prelude** and **Postlude**. The reaction of my rather opinionated organ teacher to the music of John Stainer is typical of many. Stainer's music was far too old fashioned and sentimental for most musicians of the 1960's and 70's. But like Sir Arthur Sullivan, who admired him greatly, Stainer (1840-1901) was very much a man of his time. It was Victorian England and he wrote music to appeal to the singers and church congregations of that era. Even Stainer himself admitted that his music was for his time and didn't expect it to endure. However, much of his music does endure. It endures because it is well crafted and comes from the heart. His most famous work, the cantata "The Crucifixion", is still popular today. We can still find his tunes in most hymn books (#208, #698). For today's Introit, the choir is singing Hymn #371 to a tune by Stainer no longer found in today's hymn books. He wrote this tune especially for the words by Charles Wesley. The very popular tune Hyfrydol eventually was linked up with this hymn and Stainer's much more sentimental and prayerful tune "Love Divine" has unfortunately been left by the wayside. We owe him a lot, not just for his beautiful church music but for his work as a musicologist in reviving interest in Renaissance music and for reviving the popularity of Christmas carols. I strongly feel that sentimental music such as his, still has its place today.
