Notes from the Director of Music

The organ music today is by three composers about whom we know very little. Henry Heron (d.1795) and William Goodwin (d. 1784) were organists in churches in London in the 18th century. They both published sets of organ pieces which remain popular to this day. Jaques Louis Battman (1818-1886) was a French organist, composer and arranger. His piece "Recessional" which is today's Postlude, is reminiscent of the outdoor band concerts one used to hear frequently in many communities. These simple marches were light, easy pieces that a community band could easily play in a bandstand or park lawn. I remember one summer I played my trombone with the Chippewa Citizens' Band in a park by the Niagara River. Toward the end of the march, with no shelter, a huge gust of wind suddenly sprang up, blowing down all of the music stands like falling dominoes. The conductor carried on with only a second horn reading from a wellsecured music stand, while a trumpet and snare drum bravely improvised to try and finish the piece. I think I managed to play the last note. Such was the fun of outdoor concerts. I recall that this band had a very odd collection of instruments which included a valved trombone and both a cornet and trumpet.

The trumpet and cornet are very similar instruments, but the cornet has a more mellow sound. The cornet stop on the organ however, is quite different from the trumpet stop. The Prelude is a type of piece which comes from a time when the "cornett" was remembered as a popular combination with the early organ. The "cornett" was a wooden pipe with finger holes drilled in it and used a mouthpiece similar to a trumpet. The "cornet" organ stop attempted to duplicate this sound with the use of particular combinations of pipes. The trumpet stop, as used in today's Offertory, is one of a family of pipes with a vibrating reed. Just to confuse the issue, the stop used today as the trumpet stop was actually an oboe stop, once used in the organ at Queen Street United Church. The sound is similar, and in its position high up on top of the organ chamber, it sounds like a happy little trumpet. A piece for organ, trumpet or trumpet stop and voice is presented as our Anthem and was written by the famous English composer Henry Purcell.

Relief for survivors of Cyclone Pam
