

Scripture Reading

Revelation 1 (selected verses)

The revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave him to show his servants what must soon take place; he made it known by sending his angel to his servant John, who testified to the word of God and to the testimony of Jesus Christ, even to all that he saw.

Blessed is the one who reads aloud the words of the prophecy, and blessed are those who hear and who keep what is written in it; for the time is near.

John to the seven churches that are in Asia:

Grace to you and peace from him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before his throne, and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.

I, John, your brother who share with you in Jesus the persecution and the kingdom and the patient endurance, was on the island called Patmos because of the word of God and the testimony of Jesus. I was in the spirit on the Lord's day, and I heard behind me a loud voice like a trumpet saying, 'Write in a book what you see and send it to the seven churches, to Ephesus, to Smyrna, to Pergamum, to Thyatira, to Sardis, to Philadelphia, and to Laodicea.'

Then I turned to see whose voice it was that spoke to me, and on turning I saw seven golden lamp-stands, and in the midst of the lampstands I saw one like the Son of Man, clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash across his chest. His head and his hair were white as white wool, white as snow; his eyes were like a flame of fire, his feet were like burnished bronze, refined as in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of many waters. In his right hand he held seven stars, and from his mouth came a sharp, two-edged sword, and his face was like the sun shining with full force.

When I saw him, I fell at his feet as though dead. But he placed his right hand on me, saying, 'Do not be afraid; I am the first and the last, and the living one. I was dead, and see, I am alive for ever and ever; and I have the keys of Death and of Hades. Now write what you have seen, what is, and what is to take place after this. As for the mystery of the seven stars that you saw in my right hand, and the seven golden lampstands: the seven stars are the angels of the seven churches, and the seven lampstands are the seven churches.

Notes from the Director of Music

Today there are multiple themes in our service. This is the first Sunday in Lent and so we rely on our great standby for seasonal **Introits**, Healey Willan. Our first **Hymn** is also appropriate for opening the season of Lent.

Last Sunday we heard the organ music from the Mass for the Convents by François Couperin. I will play one more piece from this set which was intended to be played during the offertory. It is too long to be played as an offertory at our service so I am playing it as the **Postlude**. It is played for the most part on the main pipes of the organ called the Principal Chorus or "Les Grands Jeux" in French.

The month of February has been declared Black History Month and so our anthem is one of the most inspired of the African-American Spirituals. It was actually composed by a Native American named Wallace Willis whose family had been slaves. He himself was declared a "freedman" before the end of the Civil War. Thanks to Willis, this and several traditional spirituals that he knew and had sung were written down and later made popular by the Jubilee Singers of Nashville in the 1870's. Were it not for this, many of these wonderful soul-felt songs might have been forgotten.

This year, Valentine's Day happens to fall on a Sunday. I wondered how closely this day is linked with the church and in my research I discovered quite a fascinating history with links to the church, pagan festivals, and mythology. But the origins do go back to a St. Valentine in the third century in Rome who was executed for secretly marrying soldiers despite a decree from the emperor forbidding soldiers to marry. The association with a celebration of romantic love came in the middle ages and Valentine's Day was mentioned by the English poet Henry Chaucer. The sending of cards started in the 18th century and the festival of St. Valentine's Day has become a largely secular event although St. Valentine is still recognized in the liturgical calendar of some denominations. And so I will give a nod to the day by playing at the Offertory, a very romantic piece by one of the giants of the Romantic era, Peter Tchaikowsky. The lovely theme of this piece was used by Glenn Miller during the war years with very romantic lyrics which some may remember as "This is the story of a starry night". Because of its origins with the classical repertoire, the song was banned by the BBC in

England for a time. Remember that Tchaikowsky had no lyrics in mind when he wrote it so without any associations, we can hopefully appreciate it as just a nice piece of music.
