Scripture Readings

Exodus 15:22-24, 16:1-3, 17:1-3

Then Moses ordered Israel to set out from the Red Sea, and they went into the wilderness of Shur. They went for three days in the wilderness and found no water. When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water of Marah because it was bitter. That is why it was called Marah. And the people complained against Moses, saying, 'What shall we drink?' ...

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, 'If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger.'..

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarrelled with Moses, and said, 'Give us water to drink.' Moses said to them, 'Why do you

quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?' But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?' ...

Responsive Psalm 95

O come, let us sing to the Lord;

let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation!

Let us come into God's presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to the Lord with songs of praise!

For the Lord is a great God, and a great Sovereign above all gods;

in whose hand are the depths of the earth, and also the heights of the mountains. The sea belongs to God who made it, and the dry land, which God's hands have formed.

O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our maker!

Do not harden your hearts, as at Meribah, as on the day at Massah in the wilderness, when your ancestors tested me, and put me to the proof, though they had seen my work.

For fourty years I loathed that generation and said,

"They are a people whose hearts go astray, and they do not regard my ways." Therefore in my anger I swore, "They shall not enter my rest."

Hebrews 3:12-15, 4:1-3a, 9-13

Take care, brothers and sisters, that none of you may have an evil, unbelieving heart that turns away from the living God. But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called 'today', so that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin. For we have become partners of Christ, if only we hold our first confidence firm to the end. As it is said, 'Today, if you hear his voice, do not harden your hearts as in the rebellion.'

Therefore, while the promise of entering his rest is still open, let us take care that none of you

should seem to have failed to reach it. For indeed the good news came to us just as to them; but the message they heard did not benefit them, because they were not united by faith with those who listened. For we who have believed enter that rest, just as God has said, 'As in my anger I swore, "They shall not enter my rest," 'though his works were finished at the foundation of the world. So then, a sabbath rest still remains for the people of God; for those who enter God's rest also cease from their labours as God did from his. Let us therefore make every effort to enter that rest, so that no one may fall through such disobedience as theirs.

Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart. And before him no creature is hidden, but all are naked and laid bare to the eyes of the one to whom we must render an account.

Notes from the Director of Music

David Cameron turns eighty tomorrow. David was Director of Music here for a brief time, just prior to my arrival. Over the years he has distinguished himself as a church organist, choir director, teacher, scholar, composer and president of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. To celebrate his birthday, he did what he loves to do best: yesterday at St. George's he assembled a choir and orchestra and conducted some of his favourite music including some of his own. The choir included some of our own choir members. While at St. Andrew's, in November 2013, he made an arrangement of the famous hymn Tell Out, My Soul and dedicated it to our choir. I thought as a tribute to David Cameron on his 80th birthday, we would sing this superb arrangement as the Anthem.

My wife celebrated her birthday this past week, and in thinking of birthdays, I thought I would check to see who else had a birthday that coincided with David's.

Robert Lowrey was born March 12, 1826 in New England. In 1854 he was ordained as a Baptist Minister and later taught at Lewisburg and became its chancellor. He wrote over 500 hymns and published and edited a few hymn books including Pure Gold and Royal Diadem which were published in 1871 and 1873. I am happy to have copies of these old books in the Piano Museum. Many of his hymns endure to this day including the one we are singing for the Introit, found in our Book of Praise #699 with words by Fanny Crosby. Throughout his career, Robert Lowrey thought his real calling was as a preacher, but it was his gift as a hymn writer, something he did on the side, which makes him remembered to this day.

Félix Alexandre Guilmant was born March 12, 1837 at Boulogne-sur-mer. His father was a well-known organist and by 1871, Alexandre had moved to Paris and become one of the greatest organists of his day. He was organist of the Grand Organ at La Trinité for over 30 years and later taught at the Paris Conservatoire. He was a prolific composer and toured throughout the world. The **Prelude** and **Offertory** were composed for church use. The **Postlude** was composed for the closing music at weddings, but I think it works just as well for a birthday celebration.
