#### 2 Corinthians 4:5-10

For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. For it is the God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness', who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies.

#### Ephesians 5:8-11, 14b

For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light— for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. ## Notes from the Organ Scholar

The **Introit** is taken from number 355 in the Book of Praise and uses light in many different contexts. We hear about Christ as the enlightenment of our hearts and minds, the light of Heaven, and the dispelling of darkness. The music was originally published as part of a Welsh hymnal from the mid-19<sup>th</sup> Century, but has sadly fallen out of popularity since then.

The **Anthem** this morning has a very odd history indeed. The music is by Charles Hubert Hastings Parry and was taken from a chorus in his oratorio *Judith*. Since the poetry has one fewer line than the music, Parry's solution was to simply repeat the last line of text, with a reflective, meditative effect. Ironically, the poet, John Greenleaf Whittier, was a Quaker who objected to hymn singing altogether and preferred to enjoy the "dews of quietness" and wait for the "still small voice of calm". More importantly for our service today, the second stanza speaks about the calling of those "beside the Syrian Sea", i.e. Sts. Andrew and Peter, and their service of Christ.

All the organ music today is by one of my favourite composers, Louis Vierne, who celebrates the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his death this year. Much like stained glass does to the observer with light, Vierne's organ music showers the listener with a myriad of tonal and harmonic colours so typical of the French Romantic style.

The **Offertory** is from Vierne's 24 Pieces in Free Style, for organ or harmonium. The collection was designed to show off the capabilities of the instrument, giving us a broad spectrum from the quiet "Meditation" to the thunderous "Carillon" and everything in between.

Vierne's Symphony no. 1 in d minor comprises 6 movements of varying length, styles, moods, and difficulties. Our **Prelude** is the third movement, which evokes images of the countryside, rolling hills, and all things pastoral. Vierne calls for the use of oboes and flutes in the manuals, showing the broad timbral capabilities of the organ while keeping with the rustic theme.

The **Postlude** is the sixth and final movement of the first symphony, and brings a thunderous end to a remarkable piece of music. There is very little that needs to be said about it except perhaps to quote renowned organist Olivier Latry, Vierne's successor at Notre Dame Cathedral: "With French music, it's never loud enough!"

A Radical Suggestion Threatened All Churches In Canada Once Upon A Time

In 1875, Presbyterians were Canada's largest protestant denomination with 634 ministers, 600,000 members and over a thousand congregations. Then George Munro Grant, Queen's principal and frequent preacher at St Andrews, proposed that all denominations, including Roman Catholics, join together and become; 'The Church of Canada.' "Sectional feeling would then disappear," Grant promised, "and all would be thought of as simply Christians." Despite his large ecumenical heart and great political skills, Grant was unable to convince a majority of his contemporaries. Letters of dismay poured in to the editors of Kingston's 13 newspapers and must have made fascinating reading. I wonder what the congregation of St. Andrew's thought? I wonder what we think of the proposal today? - Rose DeShaw
