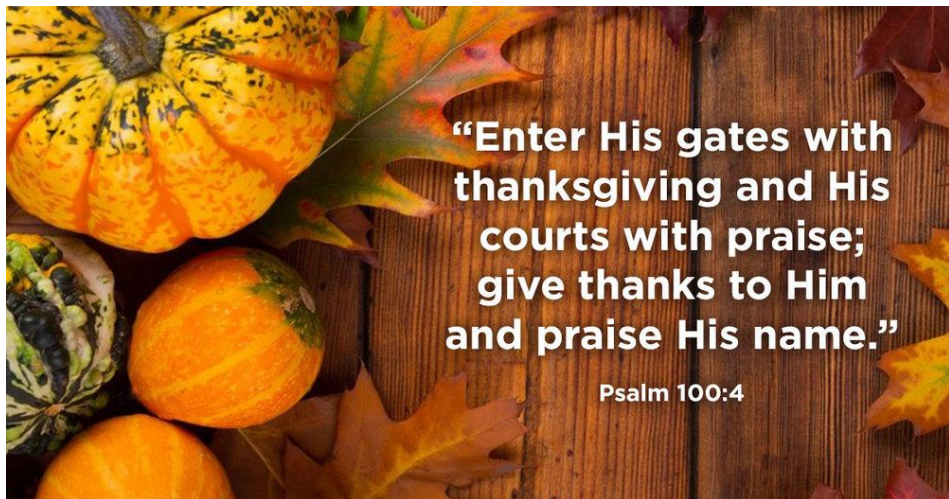

Then Jesus asked, 'Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?' ## NOTES FROM DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Thanksgiving weekend seems to be a time of transition: a goodbye to Summer and hello to the beginning of Autumn. And so our first **Prelude** today reflects a very sad farewell to summer with the somewhat mournful Adagio movement from the Toccata, Adagio and Fugue of Bach. This piece and the Offertory are played in their original form for organ. The rest of today's music, like leaves changing colour, or the life cycle of a Monarch butterfly, have gone through changes. The second **Prelude** is from a set of piano Etudes by the largely forgotten French composer, Cécile Chaminade

(1857-1944). I hope to play more of her music in the future – it is truly beautiful. The piece was arranged by William Fenton.

The **Introit** is based on the familiar Welsh folk tune “Ash Grove” with words by Omer Westendorf and arranged by S. Drummond Wolf. The **Anthem**, in similar fashion, uses the old German tune “Wie Lieblich ist der Maien” from 1581 with a text by J.S.B. Monsell (1811-1875) and all put together for choir and organ by Healey Willan.

The **Offertory** is by Frenchman Alexandre Guilmant (1837-1911) whose music was featured last week. It is naturally a more solemn piece and comes from a collection of his works which feature a complete variety of moods and uses. Guilmant knew the instrument well and was an inspiration to many. The service ends as it started, with a piece by J.S. Bach. The **Postlude** was originally written for orchestra and used in his Cantata no. 79. It was arranged for organ by Lani Smith. Thanks to him and many others, we can enjoy pieces of music with different colours, in a new light.

### **Roof Update**

We are all celebrating the completion of the work around the cupola (re-leading of glass, installation of new lighting and a winch for the chandelier) and replacement of all the bulbs in the sanctuary with energy efficient LEDs.

The P&M committee are also able to provide an update on the roof. You might remember that at the AGM in February, the congregation agreed to designate funds for the repair of roofing sections that had failed. Following this meeting, there was some concern that perhaps the whole roof was coming to the end of its lifespan, but an engineering study was commissioned that indicated that a repair of the roof would be an appropriate investment. Tenders are therefore now being sought.

Together, the cupola and roofing projects are estimated to total \$170,000. The congregation's response to the Capital Appeal, with commitments and contributions of \$130,000, has permitted this essential work to be done without significantly diminishing the Trust Funds.

We thank God for this wonderful gift of a church home of such heritage and beauty, and for the ability to maintain it for future generations.

### International Day of the Girl Child (Oct. 11)

Poonam was only 13 years old when she learned that her parents had arranged for her to be married in a few months. In India, early marriage is a very common practice, deeply rooted in tradition. Unfortunately, it also takes away a girl's right

to a childhood, disrupts her schooling and puts her at risk of early pregnancy. Meera Devi works with PWS&D partners in Poonam's village and because of Meera's work, Poonam's family understands the negative impacts of early marriage. The wedding has been postponed, and a joyful Poonam is completing her schooling. *PWSD helps girls decide their own future. This year, through offerings designated "Mission," members of St. Andrew's Kingston have a goal of contributing \$3,700 to the work of Christ through PWS&D.*
