

Scripture Readings

Deuteronomy 26: 1-11

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, ‘Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.’ When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: ‘A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.’ You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Luke 24:36, 44-49

Then he said to them, ‘These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.’ Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, ‘Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from

Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high.’

NOTES FROM DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

This being Communion Sunday, our music gets a bit more subdued and serious and with it, the sound of the organ. By constructing pipes similar to the diapason but much narrower, the upper harmonics become more prominent and the pipes take on a string-like sound. These pipes of the string family became more widely used as the music of the Romantic era crept in. By themselves, the string pipes can provide a soft sound for accompanying a quiet choral work such as the **Anthem** by Englishman Walter Bell. The **Introit** is hymn 533 and the string sound works well when played by organ alone or when accompanying the choir alone. The sound is however, not substantial enough to lead congregational singing.

The **Preludes** are by rather obscure composers of the 19th century. Georg Goltermann was born in Hanover in 1824 and was a concert cellist. Most of his musical output was for cello and it is probably no coincidence that his “Prelude no.6” for organ works best on the string pipes.

The string pipes work well in combination with other kinds of pipes. The **Offertory**, by German organist Sigfrid Karg-Elert, is a good example of the string pipes being used as an accompaniment for flute and diapason solo pipes. The **Postlude** is a Chorale Prelude with the well-known melody in the pedals. It begins softly with string pipes and then builds up in volume with the addition of flutes, diapasons and finally reeds for a dramatic finish – a good way to finish our little exploration of the sounds of the organ.

International Women's Day (March 8)

Access to information and services for reproductive health rights remains a significant challenge for women around the world, especially in

poor communities. Many women are not able to decide if or when they have children, or how many. Girls forced into early marriages are made vulnerable to sexually transmitted infections and early pregnancy. It is proven time and again that empowering women helps improve economic growth and development—part of this must be access to necessary health services and the ability to make decisions about their bodies. PWS&D is responding in India to raise awareness of sexual and reproductive health and provide women and girls with a network of support so they can decide their own futures.

This year, through offerings designated “Mission,” members of St. Andrew’s Kingston have a goal of contributing \$3,700 to the work of Christ through PWS&D.
