Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: "And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least

among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

NOTES FROM DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Before we head into a new year and the season of Epiphany, we have a final tribute to the master of the French Noël, Louis Claude D'Aquin. The **Prelude** is a rather gentle piece, played on the wooden flute pipes. By contrast, the **Postlude** uses many pipes including oboes and trumpets and is quite playful and humorous in places, reminding us that the Christmas /Epiphany season should be a happy time. By now most of the congregation have noticed that some of the large display pipes are missing and that some of the pipes look shiny new. These display pipes are from the original Hook and Hastings organ of 1890 and were originally painted in a variety of colours. They were painted over with gold paint at least 90 years ago when the organ was rebuilt and expanded. Over the years the paint has tarnished and so the display pipes are being sanded and repainted. About half of the pipes that you can see make a sound, the rest are purely for decoration. The visible pipes that are speaking pipes are among the lowest notes on the Great division of the organ.

For the celebration of the coming of the magi, we have an **Introit** by Healey Willan, an anthem from our old Book of Praise, and a chorale prelude by Johann Pachelbel. The **Anthem** is a hymn which

has been omitted from the new Book of Praise. The words are by William Pitts who died in 1903. The **Offertory** is based on the German Chorale Wo Gott zum Haus.

Star Gift

Epiphany is the celebration of God's presence breaking through to shine as a light in the darkness. This morning you will have been invited to receive a star gift. We might make a log book of times when we have heard the word used in the world around us, and how God has spoken to us at that time. Perhaps we might share some initial 'findings' half way through the year?
