

While it is good to be able to re-open the doors to this sanctuary, this service of worship will not be as we knew worship prior to this pandemic. The Elders thank all present for their willingness to abide by the protocols established (summarized on the inside of the back page of this bulletin), as we honour the guidance of public health authorities and denominational leadership.

Understanding that there will be many members who are not able to return to worship in the sanctuary, the elders agreed to continue with an online worship opportunity. Several significant investments have been made to allow this service to be streamed live from a camera placed high on one of the back pillars, thanks to the skill of Benjamin and Greg, and available for all to view anytime during the week on the St. Andrew's YouTube channel (see our church website for the link – www.standrewskingston.org).

SCRIPTURE READING

I Kings 3:6-9

And now, O Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?'

Galatians 3:23-29, 4:4-7

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed ... But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if

you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise. But when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son ... so that we might receive adoption as children. And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, 'Abba! Father!' So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God.

NOTES FROM DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

It is great to be at the organ console on a Sunday morning once again. Of course I miss my choir very much. This bulletin gives me an opportunity to say a little bit more about the music. We are indeed happy to be able to worship together in our beautiful Sanctuary once again despite the restrictions. So I am playing a happy little Trumpet Voluntary for the **Prelude**. It was composed by English composer John Travers (1703-1758) whose success as a church musician led him to be appointed to the Chapel Royal in 1737.

With the subject of prayer in mind, after the sermon we will hear music composed for an opera about Hansel and Gretel. German composer Engelbert Humperdinck (1854-1921) was inspired by Wagner and the opera house in Bayreuth and composed an opera based on a children's fairy tale in 1893. It remains hugely successful to this day and is one of the few operas suitable for the whole family. At this point in the opera, the children are lost in the forest and they sing this comforting prayer as night falls.

To end the service on a happy note, (or happy notes), this **Postlude** by American composer Darwin Wolford does the trick. He based this piece on a happy theme of G.F. Handel and stuck closely to Handel's original harmonies. Wolford was born in 1936 and was Director of Organ Studies at Brigham Young University for many years.

Protocol for Worship in the Sanctuary of St. Andrew's during a Time of Pandemic

The Apostle Paul, in his pursuit of sharing the gospel message, says that in doing so he is "forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead" (Philippians 3:13). Looking ahead is not always an easy thing to do, especially in the rapidly changing environment that we live in today. For congregations, it can be a struggle to know how to continue to reach out to their communities and share the gospel in meaningful ways. The PCC has developed a network of coaches
