

While it is good to be able to re-open the doors to this sanctuary, this service of worship will not be as we knew worship prior to this pandemic. The Elders thank all present for their willingness to abide by the protocols established (summarized on the inside of the back page of this bulletin), as we honour the guidance of public health authorities and denominational leadership.

Understanding that there will be many members who are not able to return to worship in the sanctuary, the elders agreed to continue with an online worship opportunity. Several significant investments have been made to allow this service to be streamed live from a camera placed high on one of the back pillars, thanks to the skill of Benjamin and Greg, and available for all to view anytime during the week on the St. Andrew's YouTube channel (see our church website for the link – www.standrewskingston.org).

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Leviticus 19:1-4, 9-10

The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: Speak to all the congregation of the people of Israel and say to them: You shall be holy, for I the Lord your God am holy. You shall each revere your mother and father, and you shall keep my sabbaths: I am the Lord your God. Do not turn to idols or make cast images for yourselves: I am the Lord your God.

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God.

John 17:6-11

‘I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. NOTES FROM DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Sometimes it is just bad luck that a talented composer is not better known. Last week we heard music by the famous Johann Pachelbel whose “Canon” is frequently played at weddings today. He was the student of Heinrich Schwemmer who also taught the little known Johann Krieger. Krieger was born in Nuremberg, the son of a rug maker. He managed to latch on to some good teachers and ended up at a church in Zittau where he remained organist for 53 years until his death in 1735. He was a prolific composer and his music well respected by many including Handel. He would be better known had it not been for the Seven Years War which destroyed the city, the church and most of his manuscripts. Ah, the many tragedies of war.

One of the most famous composers of all time is Felix Mendelssohn. He is probably best known for his orchestral works, but we owe him thanks for reviving the organ music of J.S. Bach. Shortly before his death in 1847, Mendelssohn published a set of organ sonatas which remain popular with organists. Two movements of his Sonata No. 2 are played as the **Prelude** and the third movement is played for the **Postlude**.

Albert Hay Malotte (1895-1964) was a composer for the Walt Disney Studios, providing music to accompany many cartoons. However, he is best known for his setting of the Lord’s Prayer, which sold hundreds of thousands of copies around the world. It remains available in a variety of keys and arrangements and continues to be performed at weddings, funerals and church services. It has become the most popular musical setting of this two-thousand-year-old prayer.

Protocol for Worship in the Sanctuary of St. Andrew's during a Time of Pandemic

- you will be greeted by an usher outside the open door of the sanctuary to answer any questions and ensure a measured entrance into the church
- the wearing of face masks at all times in the building is mandatory

- there will be no congregational singing or choir: to ensure no sharing of materials, the lyrics to hymns and scripture passages are included in the bulletin
- you will be asked to leave from the same door in which you entered, beginning from the back pews
- our offerings of thanksgiving and dedication will be received at the back of the sanctuary as we leave
- we are asked to leave the sanctuary immediately to avoid close proximity to others in the narrow aisles at the back or in the foyers, and we will have no opportunity for fellowship within the church facilities
