SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Hebrews 2

Therefore we must pay greater attention to what we've been taught, so that we do not drift away. For if the promise made through angels was binding, and every infringement or disobedience received a just penalty, how can we escape if we ignore so great a salvation? This salvation, which was first announced by Christ, was confirmed for us by those who heard the message. God also confirmed their witness to it with signs, wonders, miracles of all kinds – and by freely distributing the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

God did not create the inhabited world of which we speak to have it be rules by angels. Somewhere in this testimony is found:

'What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them?

You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honour, subjecting all things under their feet.'

Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honour because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying,

'I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.'

And again,

'I will put my trust in God.'

And again,

'Here am I and the children whom God has given me.'

Since, therefore, the children of God are flesh and blood, Jesus likewise partook of that flesh and blood, that by dying he might render powerless the one who has the power of death – that is, the devil – and free those whose fear of death had enslaved them all their lives. Surely Jesus came to help not the angels but rather the children of Sarah and Abraham! Therefore, Jesus had to become like his sisters and brothers in every way, in order to be a merciful and faithful high priest on their behalf, to make atonement for the sins of the people. And since Jesus suffered while being tempted, he is able to help others who are bring tempted.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

To conclude the season of Lent and to prepare for Holy Week, the **Preludes** today are what we could call "meditations" on three hymn tunes. The composers are all American and their music was most popular during the sixties and seventies. The origin of the tune names is quite interesting. The first **Prelude** is based on the tune Rockingham, named after the Marquis of Rockingham who was twice prime minister of Great Britain. He was a patron and friend of the composer Edward Miller. The second **Prelude** is based on the tune *Gethsemane* which is a traditional American folk hymn from around 1842. It is also called Christ in the Garden or While passing a garden. The last **Prelude** is based on a tune by Ithmar Conkey who was an organist and choir director at Central Baptist Church in Norwich, Connecticut. Apparently, one Sunday morning he was frustrated because only one soprano had shown up for the choir and so Conkey walked out of the service. One of the hymns to be sung that morning was "In the cross of Christ I glory" and Conkey didn't like the tune. So he composed a new tune and named it after his one faithful soprano, Beriah S. Rathbun. It is likely that a relative of Mrs. Rathbun, Hugo Burghardt Rathbun, made his way to Ontario and helped to create the prosperous town of Deseronto. He and his family paid completely for the erection of a Presbyterian Church there in 1881. The original pipe organ is still in use and is the oldest in the area.

The **Anthem** is another meditation on on arrangement of a hymn tune. Harrison Oxley was an English cathedral organist and the first to introduce girls into the previously all-male choir. This was in 1970. He received a lot of criticism for this and when a new Provost of the cathedral began to phase out the girls in 1981, Oxley resigned.

The **Postlude** is the well known Victorian ballad from 1892. The music was composed by English composer Michael Maybrick who used the alias Stephen Adams. The arrangement for organ is by Dorothy Thompson Asman. Next week we celebrate Christ's triumphal entry into the Holy City.

MISSION MOMENT



Penjani Sichinga holds a special place in his heart for the David Gordon Memorial Hospital (DGMH) in northern Malawi, where he has worked since 2004. DGMH is a rural mission that serves a population of 120,000. Due to its remote location, poor accommodation and few incentives, the hospital sees a high staff turnover rate. Penjani had encouragement and support from the Synod of Livingstonia Health Department to pursue medical studies to become a certified doctor. He finished his studies in 2021, and thanks to support from

Presbyterians Sharing, is now working on completing an internship at the Livingstonia University Teaching Hospital in Zambia. After Penjani completes his final medical training requirement, he will return to work at DGMH—but this time as a fully certified doctor!

In 2022, members of St. Andrew's Kingston have committed to a goal of raising \$31,849 to support a witness through Presbyterians Sharing.
