

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Anyone who has attended a wedding this past summer, has likely heard the famous "Pachelbel's Canon" as the bride came up the aisle. Johann Pachelbel was born in Germany in 1653 and died there in 1706 after having studied and performed in other parts of Europe. He is best known for his chorale preludes and his fugues. His music tends to be a little more adventurous than his contemporaries and it is said that he had an important influence on Bach's writing of fugues.

Richard Hey Lloyd (1933-2021) was a popular English cathedral organist and composer. He was dedicated to choir schools and the Royal School of Church Music and composing was his favourite past-time. He produced over 600 anthems, canticles and arrangements. His compositions are well-liked, accessible and beautifully crafted. "The Call" is one of the more popular and was dedicated to the Choir of York Minster. The centuries old words are put together with music by Ralph Vaughan Williams in our hymn #565.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Welcome

We extend a warm welcome to all who are worshipping with us this week, in person and online. We are happy that you're here, and hope you find the service meaningful and satisfying. An especially warm welcome to the Rev. Barry Carr who is leading our worship this morning. Rev. Carr is currently the minister of Community Presbyterian Church - an amalgamation between Almonte Presbyterian and St. Andrew's Presbyterian Carleton Place into a unified congregation worshipping in Almonte. He has served this faith community since 2013. Prior to beginning his studies for ministry, Rev. Carr retired from a 30year career working in many areas of the manufacturing process at General Motors. Rev Carr grew up in Ajax, Ontario and lived there until moving to Almonte to begin ministry in the Eastern Lanark region. He currently lives in Toledo, Ontario with his wife, the Rev Marianne Emig Carr, of First Presbyterian Church Brockville. He has two children from a previous marriage and two step children from his wife's previous marriage. The couple was blessed to become grandparents in 2017 and again in 2020. He enjoys photography, movies, and listening to jazz music. He is also a big sports fan who has coached baseball, soccer, and badminton teams, and loves conversing about most athletic activities. He likes getting out on his bicycle whenever possible and keeping himself in good physical condition. Connecting the church to the community is very important to Rev Carr. He remarks: "I believe we, as a society, can do more for the vulnerable ones of our world and I strive to be an active part of my community towards that goal. I have been involved in settling refugees fleeing war conflicts in Syria and Ukraine, engaging with a blend of church and community partners and resources. I have served as a Board Member of Home Hospice North Lanark. Most recently, I collaborated with a group of volunteers to establish a meal program in Almonte, providing a free weekly meal and a place where people can gather in community."

Congregational Meeting

Immediately following the service today, there will be a congregational meeting to vote on accepting the Call candidate as minister to this congregation. Please proceed directly to St. Andrew's Hall after the

postlude. The vote will be done by casting ballots, which you will receive at the meeting. For statistical purposes, both members and adherents will have ballots

Should the majority of the congregation vote to accept the candidate, then the next order of business is to collect signatures from the congregation to affirm the vote. To this end, at the meeting, and continuing in the week following, elders will circulate a document for members and adherents to sign, showing that they agree with the decision to accept the new minister.

Envelopes for 2024

National Truth and Reconciliation Day

September 30th is National Truth and Reconciliation Day, also known as "Orange Shirt Day", in honour of 6-year-old Phyllis Webstand who wore an orange shirt, a gift from her grandmother, for her first day of school in 1973. Sadly, the staff at St. Joseph's Mission Residential School in B.C. took the shirt from her when giving her the school

uniform. While wearing an orange shirt on Saturday will not end the legacy of harm from the residential schools, it is one way to publicly and collectively remember the intense and enduring harm that was done to Indigenous children and communities through the Residential School system. It is also a way of showing support for all—Survivors and intergenerational Survivors—whose lives have been impacted by the schools.
