

Responsive Psalm 100

The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of

He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Today is **Christ the King Sunday** and today's music reflects a celebration of the reign of Christ. This is a joyous time of celebration which precedes the more solemn time of Advent. Also in a few days it is **St. Andrew's Day**. So our music is an attempt to celebrate both.

Two weeks ago I attempted to explain the difference between the cornet stop and the trumpet stop on the organ. The first **Prelude** today is another cornet voluntary, this time by Henry Heron (1738-95). Heron was a dancing and music teacher and by 1756 had moved to London. His first son was baptized at St. Andrew's Church, Holborn, where he got to know the organist there, John Stanley. Stanley (1712-1786) was a well-known blind organist and one of the more prominent composers in English history. He composed the second **Prelude** and also the **Postlude**.

The **Anthem** was arranged by American composer Carlton Young who was born in 1923 and died this year at age 97. He did much for music in the United Methodist Church, editing two hymnals in his lifetime. He arranged *Wondrous Love* for his own Methodist Festival Choir in 1982. "Sam" Young was especially fond of the art of "soft" singing as you will note at the end of the Anthem.

The **last hymn,** #612, uses a tune by Melchior Vulpius who was a cantor in Weimar in the early 1600's and composed a few hymn books in his day. The tune has been harmonized by the noted Canadian conductor and teacher Sir Ernest MacMillan (1893-1973) who was the

son of a Scottish Presbyterian minister, Rev. Alexander MacMillan, a famous hymnodist.

Mission Moment - Aid for Afghanistan



Over the past two years, Canadian aid organizations advocated to remove legal barriers to much-needed aid in Afghanistan. The barriers prevented aid organizations, including PWS&D, from providing urgent humanitarian assistance since the Taliban took control in

August 2021. The recent parliamentary adoption of Bill C-41 now enables Canadian aid organizations to provide crucial aid in Afghanistan safely and effectively. Bill C-41 is vital to improving access to health care, ensuring access to food, water and sanitation, education, and protecting human dignity. As winter approaches, the needs are even greater. PWS&D will now support work in Afghanistan once again—an important step in coping with political, economic and climate adversity for many in the country.
