NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

One of my favourite roles in my theatrical past was that of "the learned judge" in Gilbert and Sullivan's *Trial by Jury*. In explaining how he became a judge, the comic lead sings:

So I fell in love with a rich attorney's Elderly, ugly daughter... She may very well pass for forty-three In the dusk, with a light behind her"

These words came to mind as I was reading about the life of Dietrich Buxtehude. It was customary in those days for a successor to a professional position to be offered the post if he were to marry the oldest daughter of the incumbent. Buxtehude did indeed marry the eldest daughter of his predecessor and secured the prestigious post of organist at the Marienkirche in Lübeck. Later, when he was close to retirement, Buxtehude offered the post to Handel and Handel's music theorist friend Johann Mattheson. They had traveled to Lübeck to hear the great Buxtehude play, as Bach had done. There is only one known picture of Buxtehude and it is not very flattering. Perhaps his daughter was similarly not a great looker. In any case, when the post was

offered with the condition of marriage, Handel and Mattheson left the next day.

The music of Buxtehude is heard once again for the first **Prelude** and the **Postlude**. In the "Ciacona" (also called a chaconne) it is the bass line that is important and it repeated over and over as the parts above are varied.

One of the most important composers of the first half of the 20th century was Ralph Vaughan Williams. This is another interesting name. His first name, in the old English manner is pronounced "Rafe". His last name is not Williams but Vaughan Williams with no hyphen. The **Anthem** is based on his tune "King's Weston" (see hymn #340) and is a good example of his skillful bold writing.

At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, Every tongue confess him King of glory now; 'Tis the Father's pleasure we should call him Lord, Who from the beginning was the mighty Word.

From the lips of sinners unto whom he came,
Faithfully he bore it spotless to the last,
Brought it back victorious when from death he passed:

At his voice creation sprang at once to sight, All the angel faces, all the hosts of light, Thrones and dominations, stars upon their way, All the heavenly orders, in their great array

Brothers, this Lord Jesus shall return again, With his Father's glory, with his angel train; For all wreaths of empire meet upon his brow, And our hearts confess him King of glory now.

Mission Moment - Habitat for Humanity, Kingston



Habitat for Humanity is a US-based nonprofit housing organization working in local communities in more than 70 countries. Habitat's vision is of a world where everyone has a decent place to live, and works toward this vision by

building and improving homes in partnership with individuals and families in need of a decent and affordable place to live. There are 2 sites here in Kingston: a row of 4 family homes on Rose Abbey Drive, and 4 nearly completed tiny homes destined for MacCauley Ave in Rideau Heights. The Rideau Heights community will eventually have 70 affordable housing spaces on 3.4 acres of land donated by the city. Each 276 ft² home has lots of windows, bathroom with walk-in shower, and includes appliances.

The tiny homes cost \$169,000 to build, and will be offered as rental units, designed for occupancy by singles, couples or a parent/child duo.

They were built in co-operation with the Limestone District School Board students in the Building Construction Internship Program. Wendy and Janet visited the tiny home build site and have clearly already begun interior decorating plans!
