NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

And so another year has come and gone. It would seem that Bach looked back sadly on that year when we hear his treatment of the chorale Das alte Jahr vergangen ist, our **first Prelude**. It is based on an old German chorale by J. Steurlein (1546-1613). The **second Prelude** is a last happy celebration of Christmas with Zachau's treatment of the well-loved *In Dulci Jubilo*. It is preceded by the chorale, the melody of which comes from the 14th century and was later harmonized by J.S. Bach. Friedrich Wilhelm Zachau was appointed organist at the church of Our Lady in Halle in 1684. One day he was approached by a little seven-year-old boy wanting lessons. His name was George Frederick Handel. He became Zachau's star pupil.

From centuries ago comes a familiar tune which has been used with various words for generations. *Greensleeves* was used for a carol found in a collection published in 1642. *The Old Year Now Away is Fled* included verses appealing to "Jack, Dick, Bessy, Mary and Joan" and also of course, the dame of the house.

As a musician, beginning a new year, I recall an anecdote about Johannes Brahms. Apparently he liked to begin his day by playing some Bach to "clean his ears out". And so I think it appropriate to play some happy Bach for the **Postlude** to begin a new year.

Mission Moment - An update from Ryandale at the Manse



To the St. Andrew's Community;

It has been almost 2 years since the first of the Ryandale residents moved into the manse and as we look back over the year 2023, we are reminded of the men that have passed through the doors - each one unique in their journey

towards homelessness, and each one unique in their recovery from addictions, mental health or poverty issues that led them to becoming homeless.

How do we measure whether we are being successful? Each day a resident is clean and sober is a success. Each time that someone with mental health issues has a supportive person to talk with, that helps to stabilize them, or simply remind them to take their medication, is a success as this is one more day of remaining housed, building up skills and confidence in themselves to take the next step in their recovery. For others, it is simply living without the stigma of being poor and homeless.

This year, Ryandale achieved a significant goal in opening a third transition house; largely due to the success of the St. Andrew's Ryandale Manse project. The increased needs of many people may require a resident be supportively housed for more than a single year. With the three houses; Victoria Street, the Manse and the new property, Ryandale is now able to provide 3 different levels of supportive housing.

How many people have been directly helped from their time of living in the Manse during 2023? Numbers do not tell the full story. Three men have found sustainable housing; 8 other men have been able to maintain their housing as they overcome their addictions or mental health problems. Four more have been able to move to a lower level of care as they progress through their healing. One resident is currently looking to return to school to earn his GED and then continue to post secondary education.

The St. Andrew's community continued support for the residents of the manse is often talked about by the residents. One of the gifts that continues to be greatly appreciated and anticipated has been the monthly meals provided by some of the wonderful cooks of the St. Andrew's community. Everybody looks forward to this monthly Sunday night meal.



The monthly Sunday night meal is different in that this meal becomes a shared time to sit together. On a day-to-day basis, residents are responsible for cooking their own food so consequently do not always eat supper together. Having this meal arrive, and all they have to do is open the dishes and see what is offered, often brings out similar feelings that you or I may experience when opening gifts. These meals are something that has been given to them, and from the perspective of having so little and so little cared about them, these meals take on an increased importance and value. This meal is something that they have not had to think about or pay for out of their limited financial resources. Even the washing up becomes a communal occasion.

A resident that recently moved in was surprised and grateful for the thought that was put into the welcoming gift that he received from St. Andrew's.

Another weekly gift that continues to mean a lot to the residents is Dawn and her 4-legged helper Joseph. Their visits and conversations are so appreciated. They bring compassion, joy and support. The guys care deeply for Dawn and her friend.

Some of the residents have been able to give back to the St. Andrew's community in small ways. This past spring and fall, some of

the residents were able to help with seasonal yard cleaning. The residents appreciate what they have by living at the manse, and a desire to care for the place comes out as an expression of pride in keeping their "space" looking neat. There are now 3 residents who have volunteered to clear snow from the church parking lot and steps on weekends when Glen is not available.

What are the hopes for this coming year? More of the same in doing our best to help individuals find a place of comfort and security to heal, and to find the on-going personal supports required to support them when it is time to move.
