

SCRIPTURE LESSONS



Psalm 19

His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?' Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews then said, 'This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

The glorious organ music of the Baroque period seemed to come to an abrupt halt with the death of Johann Sebastian Bach in 1750. As the Classical period in music slowly began, the public's focus shifted toward the concert hall with opera, instrumental recitals and most importantly, the symphony orchestra. It wasn't until Felix Mendelssohn, toward the end of his life, revived Bach's music that concert goers started to take a second look (or second hearing) of organ music.

Today's organ music pays tribute to three great composers of the 19th century who helped keep organ music alive. Other than these three, there was nothing of great importance composed for organ throughout most of the 1800's. In the Romantic period, there was a great need for expression, and structure was less important. This is why orchestras were such a big hit. Thanks to innovations in organ building, more expression could be used in playing and this enabled orchestral composers to be inspired to compose for organ. For the first Prelude, we take one more listen to the music of Belgian born composer César Franck (1822-1890) who was inspired by the organs of the great French organ builder Cavaillé-Colle. In Vienna, Johannes Brahms (1835-1897) composed numerous orchestral, instrumental and vocal works but among his last works was a set of Chorale Preludes for organ, inspired by Bach. Brahms was well aware of and sometimes intimidated by the great musical giants of the past including Bach and Beethoven. The second **Prelude** is based on the chorale O World, I must Leave Thee and it would seem that Brahms knew his end was near. Perhaps he wanted some kind of last tribute to the man whose music inspired him the most, J.S. Bach.

Franz Liszt was born in Hungary in 1811 and travelled extensively through Europe giving piano recitals. He was always close to the church, although some thought that since he played so wickedly well, he must be possessed by the devil. When he was in Rome, the pope made him an Abbé. He loved the sound of the organ and its great pallet of sound. He only composed a few works for organ, but one of his best known is his Fantasie and Fugue on B-A-C-H, again giving tribute to the great man. The **Postlude** is a Chorale Prelude – short but effective.

In England, the organ became an effective instrument for accompanying some great choral works. One of the great composers for church music who might be considered one of the last of the Romantic period, was Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). We hear his arrangement of the hymn O For a Closer Walk for our **Anthem**.

The office of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be offering an important webinar on Wednesday, 13 March from 1:30-2:30. The website explains:

"The 2021 General Assembly marked a pivotal point in the approach of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to gender, sexuality and the denomination's ministry with LGBTQI2+ people. In addition to changes to the PCC's theology and practice regarding marriage and ordination, General Assembly adopted a set of recommendations to guide the whole church to acknowledge the harm caused due to homophobia, transphobia, heterosexism and hypocrisy, to respond appropriately to that harm and to ensure that harm does not continue.

This webinar is an opportunity to review and learn more about the decisions the church has made regarding LGBTQI2+ inclusion. Staff from the General Assembly Office and the Life and Mission Agency will give a short presentation about the church's decisions, followed by time for participants to ask questions about how these decisions are applied in congregations, presbyteries, camps, colleges, national committees and other contexts within The Presbyterian Church in Canada. 

Health Workshop
program during
the summer of
2023. The program
included mental

health support and workshops run by a qualified health professional on the topics of anxiety, depression, ADHD, self-harm, suicide and other mental health topics. The opportunity for attendees to express themselves in a caring and safe environment with professional leadership took safety to the next level for the camp, and provided an opportunity for individuals to explore some of their struggles with support. The program continues to grow by providing Mental Health First Aid training to staff and volunteers as well as exploring ways that art and music therapy can be offered in a camp setting.



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
